## **Ata 556 History of Eastern Europe**

### **Course description:**

Analysis of history and politics of Eastern Europa and Balkans. The goal of the course is to make the participants familiar with the historical roots of the current problems of East European and Balkan societies. The course will concentrate its focus on the history of the region until the end of the Cold War. It will cover subjects such as Origins of the East European and Balkan Backwardness; Emergence of the National Movements; East European and Balkan Politics in the Interwar Period; Economic and Social History of Cold War Eastern Europe and Balkans; Consumption and Daily Life in Cold War Eastern Europe and Balkans; Revolutions in Eastern Europe and Balkans; Religion in Post-Communist Society; Minorities, Ethnicity and Nationalism in Eastern Europe and Balkans; Current Trends in Eastern Europe and Balkans.

### **The basic requirements:**

- 1)Required readings in this syllabus,
- 2) Regular attendance and participation in class discussions,
- 3)The students will write a research paper (10-15 single spaced pages) on a related topic.
